- 1) All genders
- 2) All ages

- 4) All sexual orientations
- 5) Raised in the region
- 6) Come from a family that originates from/ has ties to the region
- 7) Scholars/experts or individuals interested in Eastern European and Eurasian studies
- 8) Scholars/experts or individuals interested in history, politics, corruption, psychology
- Research methods that will be used:
- 1) **In person interviews** (voice recorded interviews or note taking interviews), each person would be asked to answer 6 questions.
- 2) A Google Form including multiple choice and short answer questions.
- 3) **Small group discussions** (3-6 participants) to allow for informal debate and shared reflections.
- **4) Zoom interviews** with individuals in academia or experts in Eastern European studies, history, politics and economics. (each lasting approximately 30 minutes)
